"I have something for you!"

My hope here is to put into your hands wisdom to encourage your journey with the church in loving God, in living together, in serving our neighbor and in doing what is shown to be the good and perfect will of God.

A Verse for Living Today

Life often invites us to be negative. Sometimes it seems we cannot get out of the "valley of despair." Let me suggest an experiment for the next week to move in another direction. I want you to consider saying a verse every day for the next seven. **"This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it."** Psalm 118:24

There is value in looking at a psalm from beginning to end to understand its rationale message. This is not my approach here. I want to lift a verse from the midst of this "Song of Victory." There is wisdom here that can help.

The verse declares this day you are living has been created by God. This particular day has been fashioned by Almighty God. God has created other things too: star systems, mountains, seas, wetlands, deserts, shrubs, trees, grass, flowers, vegetables, fruit, the air, dogs, cats and orangutans, different kinds of human beings, your family, your church, even this part of the world. God has made all these things.

The verse says God has also made this day. God has made many days. This verse is about this particular day. Since God has made this day, there is something remarkable about it. There is something to be experienced and enjoyed, something to do that is right and good. What is it for you? It may be different for most of us. Saying these words remind us this day is God's doing. Since it is God's doing, we have the opportunity to find what is so special about it. Or put another way, "Lord, help me to understand why this day **is** so special."

The verse continues, "...let us rejoice and be glad in it." Sometimes we cannot get enough sleep. Sometimes we are worried about finances or someone we love. There are easily a thousand things to be worried about. The psalm however invites us into celebration. We are being asked to be glad in what we discover that is good. It is not saying every situation we are in is good. The verse recalls God has made this day and invites us to locate joy and gladness. I suggest saying this verse at different times. Let it challenge your curiosity. How can we love God today, love neighbor today and celebrate? How can we experience God's goodness in the middle of an impossible diagnosis? I do not know, but the Spirit does. The Spirit wants to open our eyes to be aware of some things. Let God show you.

Wisdom from Fellow Travelers

"Somewhere along the road of your life, God must become real to you. There must be a Bethel in your life. The God of your fathers must become your God, and you, for yourself, must accept his covenant. Your Bethel may not be a sudden or dramatic experience as Jacob's was. As a matter of fact, it may be un-dramatic. It may be in a church service. It may be in your office, or your home, or your car, as you meditate, or pray, or read. But however it comes, the moment must arrive when you realize, suddenly or with a gradual dawning consciousness, that God is real, and not some vague ethereal being about which the Bible speaks and pious persons talk. He is real, as real as you are, a person like yourself; and he wants to be your God, and give you his free blessing and his love, if you will only let him. The moment must come when you realize that the God who led Abraham out of Ur, and made a covenant with him, who appeared to Jacob at Bethel, and made a covenant with him, who led Israel out of the land of Egypt, and made a covenant with them in Sinai, who met the apostle Paul on the road to Damascus, and made a covenant with him—the day must come when you realize that God is still alive and active in the world, and offers to you the same free promise of salvation and (relationship) which he offered to Jacob and the others."

Even though many of our children are still in school, recruiting for Bright Beginnings volunteers is already underway.

Each year the Richmond Area YMCAs provide hundreds of underprivileged children with new clothes and school supplies to start the school year with the same excitement and confidence as their peers. This program typically pairs two volunteer "shoppers" with a child. Together, they share a meal and shop for "back to school" clothes. The child's sizes, etc. are provided to you to make shopping easier. At the end of the shopping trip, the child receives a backpack filled with age appropriate school supplies. All of this is paid for with donations collected by the YMCA. The impact of this program is amazing!



We have volunteer spaces available for four shopping trips: Tuesday, August 3 at 6:00 pm; Thursday, August 12 at 1:00 pm; Tuesday, August 24 at 6:00 pm; and Thursday, August 26 at 1:00 pm. HIGHLIGHTING OUR PARTNERSHIP AGENCY OF THE MONTH (CROSSOVER MINISTRY)



CrossOver Ministry is one of the many local non-profit organizations that the Outreach Division contributes to on behalf of Tuckahoe. We have been supporting this mission for a number of years. CrossOver provides compassionate and quality healthcare to the uninsured in the Richmond Metropolitan Area. Established in 1983, CrossOver offers a full continuum of healthcare services that include family medicine, primary care, obstetrics, pediatrics, podiatry, dentistry, vision care, mental health treatment, and critical medications.

CrossOver started with humble beginnings and a big dream. A minister and a physician started the clinic at Word of Life Church on Broad Street. They described it as starting with “little more than a bed sheet, black examination table, and a light bulb”. After moves to Victory of Life Church, then to the Richmond Street Center, CrossOver was actually “homeless” in 1990 due to a loss of its federal funding. A year later several local businesses, including Bank of Virginia, donated the money to purchase a building at 108 Cowardin Avenue, where CrossOver became a freestanding clinic in Richmond. During the 1990’s, CrossOver not only had a permanent facility, but they also had the funding to increase the types of medical services they were able to offer their patients. Dental, vision, and pharmaceutical services were all made available. Most of the work at CrossOver is done by the generosity of some of the top physicians, surgeons, dentists, and optometrists in the area. They donate their time and talents free of charge to the patients they serve.

CrossOver has been proactive in identifying vulnerable populations in the area, and finding ways of ministering to them. Some of these populations have included people suffering from HIV and AIDS. CrossOver insures that they have the latest drug therapies available to their patients. Young women who may have high risk pregnancies are taught about the importance of prenatal care, and provided with the appropriate vitamins. Lately,

CrossOver has been concerned with the growing Hispanic population, particularly in Chesterfield County. They added a clinic in that area, and they have made a concerted effort to include Spanish-speaking personnel to open the access to healthcare without language barriers. CrossOver is not resting on their amazing accomplishments. Instead they are constantly assessing other needs in the Richmond community and finding ways to meet those needs.

CrossOver has now grown in size to support three clinics. These are located at the original Cowardin site, at Sherbourne United Methodist Church in Chesterfield, and on Quioccasin Road in Henrico. Although they rely on hundreds of volunteers, it still takes \$5000 a day to operate all three clinics. CrossOver receives federal, state, and local funding. They also rely heavily on the support of individuals. If you would like to provide additional financial support to them directly, please visit their website at www.crossoverministry.org to donate your money or your time as a volunteer. They also have monthly coffee dates where the public is invited to come and tour their facilities and discuss ways to lend support. The schedule of coffee dates is on their website.

The Outreach Division of Tuckahoe has been pleased to support CrossOver in the past and hopes to continue to offer our support in the future. They are certainly providing a valuable service in our community.

Youth Ministry

Steven Good



My first three years as Tuckahoe's Associate Pastor for Youth and Family Ministry have been nothing short of wonderful. I've loved getting to know your students and the adults who sensed a special calling to walk alongside them during the turbulent years of adolescence. I've constantly said to friends and to the scholars and practitioners who study the intersection of youth, church, and culture, that our ministry with young people at TPC would not be possible without the loving dedication of our youth advisors, Sunday school teachers, and confirmation mentors. You've made it a joyful place to be involved in ministry...just thought you should know.

When I began at TPC in June of 2007, I was just beginning to become familiar with the growing body of research in the field of youth ministry. Indeed, a specialized church-based ministry specifically geared towards the spiritual formation of adolescents is something that didn't really exist prior to 1950 and didn't become widespread until a decade later. Since adolescence, as a distinct phase of socio-psychological development, wasn't recognized as such until the turn of the century, it makes sense that churches wouldn't have thought about orienting their ministry efforts toward teens in a distinct manner. Now that youth ministry is widely understood to have a recognizable genesis and history, theological faculties have spent some time trying to make sense of that history in order to shed some light on ministry currents in the present.

Recent research has posed some challenging questions to churches: *Do our current practices of youth ministry help young people understand themselves as Christians? Are we passing on adequate understandings of God, the church, and the world?*

After interviewing more than three thousand 13-17 year olds in the U.S., the National Study of Youth and Religion makes a powerful case that the answer to that question is "no." Faith appears to be a non-impact exercise for most American teens, even when those teens are active in their churches. What seems to emerge in the belief systems of most teenagers in the U.S. is a rather instrumental view of religion. It's something that helps them feel good about themselves and teaches them to be nice and tolerant of others. Beyond that, religion doesn't seem to occupy much of the spiritual, mental, or physical space of many American teenagers. Whereas rebellion may have been the pressing concern of churches and parents a generation ago, the cultural phenomenon that seems to affect churches today is teenagers' benign "whatever-ism".

In 2008-2009 I wrote, at some length, about the findings of the NYSR. Rather than rehash old material, in the next few months I'll be reflecting about what theology and sociology might be telling the churches and offering some insights about what this might mean for the future of youth ministry at Tuckahoe. How can we help young people to understand the Christian faith? What are some areas that we're unclear about ourselves? How do we articulate an understanding of the church and the world in light of who God is? I think it's fair to say that youth ministry has become the church's laboratory. If that's the case, my hope is that the summer and fall are going to be marked by some experimentation - which means that it's time to break out the lab coats and goggles.

TUCKAHOE SPRING MASTERS

SUNDAY, MAY 16, 2010 - BELMONT PARK GOLF COURSE



The 20 golfers vying for the Church bragging rights at the Tuckahoe Spring Masters on Sunday, May 16 would ALL agree, what a **SPLENDID AND WONDERFUL** afternoon for a round of golf and fun competition! And to add to the excitement and fellowship, **TEAM #3** had its cheering gallery led by their "Riding Captain," Chet Starkey. The competition was mostly even and well matched from tee to green or near green; making putts and keeping bogeys off the card always wins over not making putts and putting bogeys on the card; thus, hitting the green and making putts is key.

In the end, Team 4 fired a 65 (6 under) with 7 birdies and 1 bogey and claimed first place; Team 1 closed with a 68 (3 under) with 3 birdies and no bogeys, taking second place; Team 3 shot 69 (2 under) with 5 birdies and 3 bogeys.
