Years ago church services were recorded on tape and mailed among those who were unable to attend services.

In the new electronic age, sermons are again available, now over the Internet. Steven Good has used his expertise and effort to set up a revised website where we can still participate even if we are not in the sanctuary.

If you go to tuckahoespres.org, under "Worship" there is a dropdown where you will see the word "Sermons". Click on "Sermons" and a new screen appears listing each of the sermons.

Each sermon has columns of Title, Pastor, Date, First Reading, Second Reading, and Audio. Let's start with the first column "Title" - double click on this and presto, a transcript of that sermon will appear. Under "Pastor" you will see who preached it. Next is the "Date" in light blue and if you click on it, the church bulletin for that Sunday appears. Under "First Reading" and "Second Reading", you will find the location of scripture used, and lastly is "Audio" and under it is an icon of a "speaker". When you click on the speaker, you open an audio feed and will hear the sermon as though you're right there in the Sanctuary.

The Sunday information is generally available early the next week and remains available for months.

Seeds

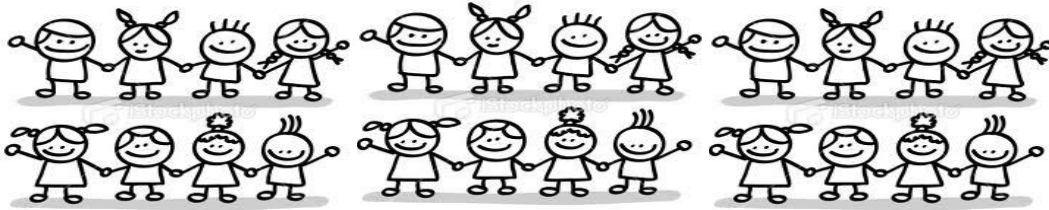

Beginning July 25 (and up to August 12), Flooring America (this is the same vendor who did the carpet and flooring in the Sanctuary and Narthex in the Fall of 2009) will be removing the existing carpet in Duntreath Hall and start the installation of the new floor.

We thought that you would be interested in exactly what type of floor and color that has been selected. The new floor will be **Mannington Commercial Luxury Vinyl Tile Nature's Paths Select Tile**. The color selected is **Limestone**. A sample of the flooring along with the paint scheme is shown on a mock up board located on the bench to the left of the entrance to the Narthex., just outside of Duntreath Hall, so stop by and check it out.

This tile comes in 18” x 18’ squares. Since the new floor is a light color, a darker contrasting wall color was chosen, giving the room a sophisticated and updated look with the use of the colors and materials of today. Additionally, we are excited about the ease with which the new floor can be cleaned (just vacuumed and damp mopped) and kept sanitary around our many food functions and other activities held in Duntreath. The new floor will provide exceptional wear resistance, stain resistance and will lower maintenance cost. No polish, no buffing.

The new floor and paint colors for Duntreath were selected by the Décor Committee. The Decor Committee is comprised of a group of church members, who have great decorating and design skills. The committee is chaired by Sallie Rhett and this committee has been responsible for paint color and flooring choices for the Sanctuary and Wilson Hall, as well as the latest project in Duntreath Hall.

We can't wait for you to see the finished product in August!

From the Interim Pastor's Study



JULY/AUGUST Newsletter at TUCKAHOE “Moving Ahead on Two Fronts”

“Summertime and the living is easy...” So go the lyrics of the song and the sentiment is an attractive one. School is out and the pool is open. Vacations come just in the nick of time for worn out workers and families who need some R & R. Even in the life of the church we slow down and have fewer meetings and activities.

But all is not on hold at Tuckahoe. Interesting endeavors are just getting underway. The Session recently adopted a new Vision Purpose, Values & Priorities statement. But now exactly what do these vision themes mean for our congregation week in and week out? That is the next step—to ask and answer such questions. Soon a reporting committee will prepare a final report. Plus, our Session divisions will begin to identify “action steps” that lead us to implement the Vision. Our new purpose statement (notice it on our bulletin cover) is “**Called by God to be the heart, voice, hands and feet of Christ where the Spirit leads us.**” We are beginning our journey of new ministry emphases.

Meanwhile, our Congregational **Nominating Committee** is meeting to nominate candidates for elder and deacon and trustee positions. The Nominating Committee also is working hard to nominate candidates to serve on Tuckahoe’s PNC—our Pastoral Nominating Committee. When they are ready to report the Session will call a Congregational Meeting to elect the PNC. A PNC begins its work by writing a CIF (Congregational Informational Form) to describe the congregation and to identify what kind of pastor they are seeking. Our new vision statement will be a prominent part of this CIF. Both the church’s Session and the presbytery’s Committee on Ministry (COM) must approve the CIF before a PNC gets the green light to begin the real search process: reading PIF’s, listening to sermons and finally interviewing ministerial candidates.

In the meantime, lots of folks are preparing for a wonderful VBS. And our Summer Mission Project (SMP) team soon will return to tell us about God’s work in the Dominican Republic. Somehow the summertime “easy living” theme does not seem to apply. In the midst of all this I hope you have an opportunity to get away, and I look forward to hearing about your times of refreshment. Thank you for praying for all these “acronym endeavors”---R&R, PNC, CIF, VBS, SMP. Prayer of course is work. So in the season of vacations and quieter schedules, let’s work a bit. Let’s pray for these endeavors to please God and to move us forward.

"Drinks" Acids are as Damaging as Sugar to Teeth" (information from Los Angeles Times/Jane E. Allen)

In an old science experiment, a teacher would put a tooth in a bottle of cola to display the perils of sugar: the tooth would disappear in a few days.

Researchers have now demonstrated that non-colas, canned iced tea drinks and even diet drinks also can weaken and erode tooth enamel, making one's teeth more vulnerable to cavities.

SUGAR - a typical 12 ounce can of soda contains approximately 10 teaspoons - and isn't the only culprit!

The malic, tartaric, citric and phosphoric acids that impart a nice, tart flavor are particularly corrosive to the tooth's protective enamel coating. "The sugar does cause problems, but it's nowhere as injurious as the acids," said Dr. J. Anthony von Fraunhofer, a professor of restorative dentistry at the University of Maryland.

In a research study, it was determined that these acids draw calcium out of the tooth enamel, and some artificially sweetened drinks are more damaging than their sucrose - or fructose sweetened counterparts. Non colas were worse than colas.

"It was astonishing to me how bad the non-colas were," von Fraunhofer said. Sodas and flavored tea were tougher on enamel than plain brewed tea, coffee and root beer.
