OUR STORY BEGINS...

You have been hearing about it for months and now the time has arrived. We are embarking on <u>**The Story</u>** and I am encouraged and excited by the response from the adults in our congregation.</u>

As I have been spiritually preparing for this journey and preparing to hear your stories, I have been reflecting on my faith story. Many of you know it, but in case you don't, here you go.

I was born in the small town of Auburn, Washington (half-way between Seattle and Tacoma). For the first several years of my life, our family was Catholic. We had a high sense of commitment to attending Sunday Mass (inspired by a little good ol' Catholic guilt). Nonetheless, I seem to think former Catholics make great Presbyterians.

Longing for a smaller church and more pastoral care, my family moved to a small Presbyterian Church, Wabash, near the shadow of Mt. Rainier. It was there I found my spiritual home. A brilliant, compassionate, and dynamic pastor was my first model of ministry and a passionate music ministry inspired me. As a child, I would ask my parents if I could remain in worship after the children's sermon so I could listen to the "grown-up" sermon (even then there was evidence of a pastor in the making) and would recount to them the points he made in our 20 minute drive home. My younger brother died when I was seven and our family had other needs that meant a move to another Presbyterian Church closer to home, White River. There I engaged my interests and it quickly became my new spiritual home. One Sunday, the pastor, a white South African named Francis, invited me to sing with him while the worship team was away on a retreat. This invitation began my involvement in the music ministry, singing in both the traditional and contemporary choir, and from there involvement on various committees.

As a teenager, I went through the same spiritual crisis as many of our youth, attempting to discern if the faith in which I was raised "fit" me. After some meandering, I was again led back to my spiritual home where I rediscovered the passion I once had as a young child. After first setting my sights on physical therapy as my chosen profession, I soon discerned a different call – into pastoral ministry.




I recall my mother said (rather prophetically), "If God wants you to be a pastor, he will make it clear." And that he did. The rest of my story you probably know.

I find it beneficial from time to time to reflect on my story in the context of God's story. I think of verses like those from Jeremiah, "*Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations.*" (1:5). Now, I am no prophet to the nations, but God has given me a message to share and you to share it with.

In times when it is hard to see ahead, whether times of national crisis or personal ones, I believe that it is helpful to reflect on our story. In the Old and New Testament, prophets continually remind the people in times of trouble and doubt that God has been there with them since the beginning and will be with them in the end. God's faithfulness never ends. It is important to reflect on that personally, as well as together with others who share similar stories.

So I hope that as you become involved in <u>The Story</u> you are inspired to share how God has been with you and how scripture, God's story, is reflected in your life. In May, we will complete this part of the journey, *to be continued* for the rest of our days together.

No. You are welcome to read along, but you are encouraged to connect with one of the worship or class opportunities. Please sign up anyway, so we can get you the materials.

ARE ALL OF THE ADULT CLASSES THE SAME?

No. Two of the classes are designed to be video and discussion based, and the third, taught by Sherry Flournoy is tailored to parents or grandparents. They will cover all the same material as the other classes with an added emphasis on how to integrate <u>The Story</u> at home with your family.

I HAVE NEVER ATTENDED AN ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS, CAN I JOIN ONE?



ARE MY CHILDREN STUDYING THE SAME STORIES?



THE STORY BOOK: The NIV version of the Bible, condensed and put in chronological order. This is what all adults will read.




THE STORY: TEEN EDITION The same book as adults but with additional helps and graphics.






EVENING CLASS FOR <u>THE STORY</u>

ALTERNATIVE ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS THE DISCOVERY CLASS

The Discovery Class is a Biblically-based discussion class that explores different ways of thinking about our Christian faith through the use of books and materials that are decided upon by the class members. The class is led by various members who volunteer (not required) to lead the discussion for a particular Sunday. We enjoy open discussions about our Christian faith, and with the help of class members, discover how our faith can have a positive and meaningful impact on our daily lives.

As we begin the fall session, we will be discussing Adam Hamilton's book, <u>Half Truths – God Helps Those Who Help Themselves and Other Things the Bible</u> <u>Doesn't Say</u>. "They sound Christian – like something you might find in the Bible. They capture some element of truth, yet they miss the point in important ways." Join us as we follow Adam Hamilton, "in his search for the whole truth by comparing some common Christian sayings with the wisdom found in Scripture".

After we have completed this book, the class will decide on the next book to study as well as materials to study during Advent and Lent.





OUTREACH

OUTREACH CORNER IN THE WELCOME CENTER

Do you ever wonder about what goes into the bins you see on your right as you enter Duntreath Hall from the sanctuary? These 10 bins are used to collect various items to be distributed to various places in our community.



Hilliard House is a temporary shelter for women and children who are on their journey to permanent housing. Toilet articles and cleaning supplies are collected and delivered to the house to be used by the residents.



CARITAS also serves homeless families. Instead of having a permanent facility, clients are housed at various churches. Toilet articles are collected and distributed when these clients are housed at Tuckahoe.

Used eyeglasses are collected and donated to the Lions Club program which provides glasses to those in need.



CentsAbility cans are

available for members for the collection of loose change. This is a denomination – driven effort (previously known as the Least Coin Offering). Donations are used to fund hunger programs – 60% goes to Presbytery of the James and 40% stays at Tuckahoe to cover the cost of monthly lunches provided to Liberation Family Services, a facility housing homeless veterans.



Cell Phones and chargers are donated to Henrico police to be given to women who do not have a phone and may be in an abusive and/or dangerous situation where a phone is needed.



School supplies for Oakgrove Bellemeade School are used to meet the needs of students who otherwise may be lacking that needed support.



Box Tops are donated to Crestview School where the school redeems them for school items through the Box Tops in Education program. This effort was initiated by Presbyterian Women.



Used ink cartridges are donated to Hearth of Henrico. From there they go to a recycling facility and Hearth receives a cash payment for them.



¹ LAMB's Basket is a food pantry which is a joint effort of area churches to serve needy residents of Henrico County who qualify. Non-perishable food items are collected and delivered monthly to the facility.

THANK YOU DICK

Eleven years ago, after retiring as Dean of Students at the University of Richmond, Dick Mateer was ready for a new challenge. Volunteering at Bellemeade Elementary through the Micah Program fit that criteria. The public school located off Jeff Davis highway housed



grades pre-K through first, and served a predominately African American Community. Most students qualified for the federal free lunch program.

After serving as a classroom volunteer for a few years, Dick felt called to organize a summer mission project in an effort to create a more friendly learning environment at the outdated Bellemeade School. For five days, members of Tuckahoe traveled to the school, where they worked miracles. Murals were painted, the cafeteria was transformed with large painted canvases of healthy food options, and the entrance was enhanced with new plantings. When the students returned in the fall, their school was a much more cheerful place.

As time passed, Dick's involvement grew. He charged his church family to become volunteers as well. Before too long, Tuckahoe was sending a weekly group of classroom helpers, all under Dick's skilled organization and leadership.
Four years ago Bellemeade School and Oak Grove School were consolidated into a brand new school housing pre-K through fifth grades. With this larger school, Dick's leadership was again called upon and he became the chairman of the

organization of churches that works with Communities in Schools as they seek to bring about positive change in the school and community.

Thanks to Dick, Tuckahoe is in its twelfth year of volunteering at Oak Grove - Bellemeade. Dick has successfully grown the group of Tuckahoe volunteers from the three who initiated the program to over 63 members who have been involved in various activities at OG/B this past school year.

Dick has decided to retire as a volunteer at Oak Grove-Bellemeade. His involvement at the school has truly been a personification of Tuckahoe's mission: "To be the heart, voice, hands and feet of Christ where the Spirit leads us."

TUCKAHOE TO CONTINUE ITS INVOLVEMENT AT OAK GROVE -BELLEMEADE SCHOOL

Although Dick Mateer is retiring as Tuckahoe's volunteer coordinator at Oak Grove-Bellemeade School our church will continue its relationship with the school. There will be opportunities to serve as a classroom assistant, be a Christmas elf, bake bread at Christmas, read on Dr. Seuss Day, address birthday cards, and participate in other special events throughout the year. STOP HUNGER NOW EVENT OCTOBER 15, 2016

Previous volunteers are sure to find this news to be very exciting! Our 4th annual Stop Hunger Now packaging event is only 12 weeks away. You know what that means? On Saturday, October 15th, decked out in the finest of hairnets, you can stand elbow to elbow with your friends to measure, pour, weigh and assemble meals to be shipped to those in need in the poorest areas of our world.

For our members that have not been able to volunteer for one of our packaging events before, or are not familiar with their efforts, Stop Hunger Now is an international hunger relief agency that has been committed to ending hunger for more than 15 years. Stop Hunger Now provides over 70% of its meals to support school feeding programs, vocational training programs, early childhood development programs, orphanages, and medical clinics.

On Saturday, October 15 Tuckahoe will be hosting our 4th annual Stop Hunger Now packaging event in Duntreath Hall. In the three years that we have hosted a packaging event, our volunteers have packaged almost 54,000 meals, (each serves 6 individuals), and our members have raised almost \$17,000 to cover the costs of these meals.

As you can tell, we will need many volunteers to package meals for shipment to places around the globe. Church members, family and friends, ages 4 and up, are welcome to participate in this fun-filled activity. If you are not able to participate in our packaging event you can still contribute to our efforts with a monetary donation. All donations go towards paying for the raw materials needed to go into the meals. 
THE CHANCEL CHOIR...ALL ARE WELCOME!!




THEOLOGY ON TAP AND JAVA WITH JESUS TO CONTINUE


