### FLOWERING THE CROSS

In spite of its function as a brutal form of execution, the cross stands at the center of our faith as a symbol of life. There can be no Easter without Good Friday, no Resurrection without the Crucifixion. Indeed, the cross, rather than the empty tomb, has held the place of honor as the primary symbol of the Christian faith. A modern expression of this idea may be found in the custom of *flowering the cross*. As we have the past several years, Tuckahoe will celebrate the *flowering of the cross* on Easter morning. You are invited to bring fresh blooms from your gardens to help fill the cross with emblems of "new life". In preparation for the Easter event, the cross will be placed in the sanctuary on Maundy Thursday, draped in purple. Then on Easter morning the cross will be adorned with greenery and flowers and lifted high in celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord.

### IN LIFE AND DEATH, WE BELONG TO GOD APRIL 14TH

10:00 A.M.- NOON, WILSON HALL

"In life and in death we belong to God.

Through the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ,
the love of God,

and the communion of the Holy Spirit, we trust in the one triune God, the Holy One of Israel, whom alone we worship and serve."

These beautiful and majestic words begin *A Brief Statement of Faith* (one of the Confessions of the PC (USA)). Over the past several months, our church has grieved the death of more than a dozen members of our family. Some of these saints were well prepared for death; others of them were not. With that in mind, we have developed a short workshop called *In Life and Death We Belong to God*. The workshop will take place on the morning of Saturday April 14<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 to noon.

We will have sessions on:

- ◆ Preparing the "Five Wishes" document. "Five Wishes" is an easy-tounderstand document that allows to you create a living will and express your final wishes. It meets the legal requirements for an advance directive in the state of Virginia.
- Helping "Baby Boomers," the "Silent Generation," and the "Greatest Generation" prepare for their end-of-life decisions.
- Helping "Gen Xers" and "Millennials" talk about end-of-life issues with their aging parents while, at the same time, considering planning for their own deaths and how it will impact their young children.
- Ensuring that your faith is reflected in your funeral or memorial service.

Your workshop leaders will be Rev. Patrick Dennis, Sarah Dennis, Rev. Diane Prevary, Ginger Spence, Jennifer McVey, Bruce McVey, and Rev. Donna Bowers, RN. Donna Bowers is an ordained PC (USA) minister and nurse who has spent much of her career specializing on these issues while ministering to the older adult population. [She is also Jennifer McVey's mom.]



#### MONTREAT WOMEN'S CONNECTION

We are excited about this summer's *Montreat Women's Connection Conference* **August 10-12,** in Montreat, North Carolina and invite all women of Tuckahoe to attend. There will be worship, workshops, fellowship, hiking, sleeping, and lots of fun! Those of us who had the opportunity to go last year had a wonderful weekend and can't wait to go back!

This year the keynote speaker is Kate Bowler. At thirty-five, after writing her first book about the American Prosperity Gospel, Bowler was a professor at the School of Divinity at Duke and a new mother, when she received the earth-shattering diagnosis of Stage IV colon cancer. Reckoning with the news, Bowler discovered, to her chagrin, that she would have to learn how to give up her own "prosperity gospel." As she learns to live with cancer as a chronic condition, Bowler speaks powerfully about the ways in which her brush with mortality has transformed her. She also frankly addresses the uniquely American concept that tragedy is a test of character and looks at the different ways that people try to rationalize suffering and catastrophe, for better or worse. Each registration will receive a copy of her book, Everything Happens for a Reason and Other Lies I've Loved.

The Jacob's Ladder non-profit enrichment program is one of the beneficiaries of the 2018 Wish List allocation. Jacob's Ladder is now in its 27th year, serving intellectually gifted, at-risk children in 4th-8th grades through a summer residential camp. Our mission is to foster the intellectual, social, emotional, and physical development of our students by focusing on issues and problems for the gifted, at-risk student caused by a lack of opportunity, family issues and poverty. With the help of gifted resource teachers and school counselors, 4th or 5th grade qualifying students submit applications and their parent(s) or caregiver(s) are interviewed at their schools. Students invited to be a part of Jacob's Ladder, now called Climbers, attend the summer residential enrichment camp and participate in the advocacy program throughout the year. A unique feature of Jacob's Ladder is that, once accepted into the program, a Climber's experience repeats each year through their 8th grade summer, a total of four or five years.

Jacob's Ladder recognizes and addresses the following needs and problems of our students:

- Environmental and cultural isolation
- Lack of belonging
- Poverty and the associated dietary and health problems
- Low self-confidence and fear of failure
- Little or no awareness of educational opportunities

The Jacob's Ladder program provides Climbers with the essential element of time — time with teachers, resident advisors and staff; time to learn a new academic subject; time for morning and evening devotions; time to learn table manners and life skills; time to be strengthened and think about the positive possibilities in their lives that lie ahead; time to be a part of something bigger than one's self. "Giving back" is an important theme for Jacob's Ladder, and we require each Climber to participate in a philanthropic project each summer.

### JACOB'S LADDER, CONT'D

A Climber's experience with the Advocacy/Follow-up program continues throughout the year. The advocacy counselor provides outreach to the Climbers by visiting them in their schools, which establishes relationships with counselors and faculty to open up a dialogue if concerns arise throughout the year and provides support to the family unit. A Winter Event and Spring Retreat provide Climbers with a much-anticipated time to gather where they renew relationships and have fun together. As part of Jacob's Ladder's continued advocacy, we have created a new position of High School Advocate to mentor alumni of the program during these subsequent years and to assist them with college searches and choice, financial aid applications, internships, and the research of career opportunities.

Jacob's Ladder is provided at no cost to the students and funded entirely by private gifts and grants. The cost for the Summer Residential Enrichment Camp and one year of Advocacy/Follow-up is \$4,225 per child. Our program of 60 Climbers currently serves students from 20 different school districts in Virginia.

This year the summer residential enrichment camp will be held on the campus of Christchurch School near Urbanna during the month of July.

We are excited to return to this location where our founder and Executive Director Emeritus, Aubrey Hall, envisioned and began this life-changing program 27 years ago.

## HIGHLAND SUPPORT PROJECT (HSP)

Highland Support Project (HSP) works with indigenous Mayan communities in the Highlands of Guatemala to develop leadership among the women of the communities as a path towards ending the cycle of dependency and poverty. The programs include the building of "clean-air" wood burning stoves and the operation of a fair trade textile

workshop. The stoves replace open air fires used for cooking inside the homes and thus reduce the incidence of respiratory illness. The textiles are sold at fair trade prices at the AlterNatives store on Cary Street in Richmond and provide needed income for the families of the Highlands. HSP's founders, Guadalupe Ramirez and Ben Blevins, will speak at our Wednesday Night Supper on April 25th about the history and mission of HSP and will have samples from the AlterNatives store on hand.

#### 2018 WISH LIST ALLOCATIONS

The TPC Committee Moderators met recently to review and discuss potential Wish List items. After an extended discussion and a short presentation from Jacob's Ladder representatives, the group decided on the following:

A. The mulch in our outdoor playground has settled and compressed and is in need of replacement in order to maintain a safe depth for cushioning potential falls. Since this is both a safety and a liability issue, it was a high priority.

Allocation: \$6,000

B. The Administration & Personnel committee has embarked on a program to provide first aid training for church personnel who are in regular contact with the congregation, including staff, ushers and Sunday School teachers. This training can be obtained at no cost from the local Rescue Squad, but as part of this program they recommend purchase of an AED defibrillator. It will be installed in the church and its proper use will be part of the first aid training.

Allocation: \$1,500

C. Our own Sue Albaugh has recently become Executive Director of Jacob's Ladder, a local charitable organization that works with Central Virginia schools to identify gifted children who are at risk for various reasons related to family and environment. Then they enroll them in their "Climbers" program to help give them the skills they need to overcome their environment and succeed at a level commensurate with their capabilities. Sue said about 95% of their climbers go to college, usually on full scholarship. All program costs for the students are funded through contributions, so the moderators decided to fund the full cost for one student "Climber".

Allocation: \$4,500


