MEMBERSHIP MATTERS

On Easter day, we received ten new members into our congregation. This was indeed God's work and so I give thanks, especially in light of the downward trend of membership in mainline churches.

What is happening on a global scale is that more people are remaining "visitors", often for years with no inclination to join. Some have good reasons — their professions require moving around or they know they may only be in an area temporarily.

But on the whole, even with stable populations, church membership is on the decline. You probably know that this is not unique to churches. Many civic and fraternal organizations are losing members and younger generations are not as eager to join as were previous generations. In the not so distant past, membership mattered; people were proud to belong to such organizations as Kiwanis, Rotary, Shriners, Masons, and scores of other groups.

But that has changed and younger generations in particular are asking why join? The predominant culture is moving away from "memberships" and talking more about "affinities." Even grocery stores are aware that people are "membership weary" and are dispensing with this marketing scheme. Affinity, on the other hand, allows one to come alongside a group or organization without lasting commitment. This means that it is easier to leave if your schedule no longer allows participation or priorities or life situations change.

So when it comes to the Church, is there reason to sustain the practice of membership? I believe this question can be addressed by reclaiming the theological sense of "member." Paul's definition was less about affinity of interests and convictions and more about essential connection to a person, Jesus Christ. In other words, his metaphor of the human body for the Body of Christ found in 1 Corinthians 12 is radical as it suggests that Christ's body can only be fully functional if the members are fully connected with and working together. For

be fully functional if the members are fully connected with and working together. For Paul, it is not a hopeful aspiration but is, in fact, the only way Christ's presence is made manifest in the world.

As Presbyterians, we add some definition to how these "members" are to function. Here is how it is outlined in the second part of our Constitution, the Book of Order: G-1.0304, The Ministry of Members.

Membership in the Church of Jesus Christ is a joy and a privilege. It is also a commitment to participate in Christ's mission. A faithful member bears witness to God's love and grace and promises to be involved responsibly in the ministry of Christ's Church.

Such involvement includes:

- proclaiming the good news in word and deed,
- taking part in the common life and worship of a congregation,
- ◆ lifting one another up in prayer, mutual concern, and active support,
- studying Scripture and the issues of Christian faith and life,
- supporting the ministry of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,
- demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,
- responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,
- living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political, cultural, and social relationships of life,
- working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment,
- caring for God's creation,
- participating in the governing responsibilities of the church, and
- reviewing and evaluating regularly the integrity of one's membership, and considering ways in which one's participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful.

As you can see, there can be no such thing as "inactive" membership — that is a contradiction. In fact, this category was eliminated from our Constitution several years ago. Membership requires active involvement, it takes time and emotional, spiritual and material commitment as well as a full integration into one's daily life. Membership is a responsibility; but, it is also a joy. There is nothing like having your life in the hands of people who love you and care for you, nothing like being stretched to grow in faith and grace with those who want nothing from you but to see you find joy in living each day more like Jesus. Church membership then is not about being proud of your association with the church; but, in understanding that you are the church, you are essential in making Tuckahoe and, by extension, the universal Church function.

This month we celebrate the birthday of the church on Pentecost, May 20. I often wonder if those first Apostles, along with the three thousand who were baptized and joined the church in Jerusalem that first Day of Pentecost, had not devoted themselves to the apostles' teachings and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and prayers (Acts 2:42) if the church would exist today. Membership in the Church matters; it matters to those who confess Jesus as Lord, it matters to our community, it matters to our society, and it matters to the world. So, I encourage you to claim your membership here at our church and ask:

"How am I helping the body be strong? Where might you seek to strengthen yourself or others? We ARE the Body of Christ himself! Let us always remember and celebrate that God has made our membership in Christ matter.

Montreat Women's Connection Conference, **August 10-12** in Montreat, NC.

There will be a chance for worship, workshops,

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fellowship, hiking, sleeping, and lots of fun! Those of us who had the opportunity to go last year had a wonderful weekend and can't wait to go back!

This year the keynote speaker is Kate Bowler. At thirty-five, after writing her first book about the American Prosperity Gospel, Bowler was a professor at the Duke

Divinity School and a new mother when she received the earth-shattering diagnosis of Stage IV colon cancer. Reckoning with the news, Bowler discovered, to her chagrin, that she would have to learn how to give up her own "prosperity gospel." As she learns to live with cancer as a chronic condition, Bowler speaks powerfully about the ways in which her brush with mortality transformed her. She also frankly addresses the uniquely American concept that tragedy is a test of character and looks at the different ways that people try to rationalize suffering and catastrophe, for better or worse. Each registration will receive a copy of her book, *Everything Happens for a Reason and Other Lies I've Loved.*

OAK GROVE/BELLMEADE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

For thirteen years Tuckahoe Presbyterian has had a volunteer presence at a Richmond City elementary school, first at Bellemeade School and then at the consolidated, new Oak Grove/Bellemeade School. Our involvement started with three classroom

volunteers, but has grown over the years. Our summer mission trip one year was a five-day project where members of our congregation enhanced the old Bellemeade School with art, new paint, and some new landscaping. For several years our Vacation Bible School and the Presbyterian Women have collected school supplies that are donated to the students.

At Christmas each year, Dick and Mickey Mateer head up two projects for the school. Tuckahoe members generously buy presents for students whose families cannot afford gifts for their children. The Mateers then deliver these gifts to the school. Also, Mickey organizes the "Tuckahoe Bakers" who bake mini loaves for the faculty and staff at Oak Grove/Bellemeade.

Other volunteer opportunities our members are part of include: writing birthday cards for every kindergartner and first grader at the school, reading to the students on "Dr. Seuss Day", helping with the "Back to School" luncheon for the faculty and staff, and assisting with the "Moving On" celebration for the fifth graders at the end of the year. This year one of our volunteers, Betty Cauley, has assisted the music teacher by playing the piano for special occasions.

It is evident that the members of Tuckahoe are committed to Oak Grove/Bellemeade. However, there is still a need for volunteers who are willing to spend an hour or two a week as a tutor or classroom assistant—no teaching experience is necessary. CALL HER BY HER NAME A LETTER FROM CINDY CORELL, SERVING IN HAITI

I couldn't say her name. Ma-nee-ka. Meen-eeka. Ma-nee-kee-a. Ma-na-ee-ka.

Her sister Dianerie repeated it, repeated it, repeated it, repeated it. It had taken me forever to learn Dianerie's name, but no matter how many times she told me, I could not pronounce her sister's name.

Finally, sensing that I am a visual learner, Dianerie, 13, wrote Menaïka's name on the little girl's left arm, then had her pose for a photograph. (It's pronounced Ma-na-ee-ka.)

This image has become one of the most powerful photographs I've seen. Maybe more powerful for me, because I have the good

fortune of getting to know these girls. After five years as a mission co-worker in Haiti, I know that the greatest gift is the people you meet. The people you come to love.

It's all right there in the photo if you really look. A 9-year-old girl with scuffed, sandy knees, bare feet and determination in her eyes that belie her age. She is Haiti. And she wants me to know her name.

Dianerie and Menaïka live with their mother and siblings in a community near the shoreline at Anse à Galets, the largest town on the island of La Gonave. It's a remote place. The island is mostly arid and dusty. There are few jobs beyond buying and selling goods and agriculture.

Buying goods means a trip across the bay to the mainland and back. It can be a slow and difficult journey.

And because there are no fresh water sources on the island and periods of drought are common, agriculture is a tough business, too. Most people just make ends meet or they leave for the mainland or other countries.

On occasion, I travel to Anse à Galets to meet with members of farmer organizations there or accompany groups visiting partners in the Episcopal Church. When I can, I try to meet with Dianerie and her family.

I first met the girls in January 2017 while visiting the beach with a church group. I was taking photos of the younger children, when then-12-year-old Dianerie approached. She bore all the characteristics of a preteen, she didn't want to smile and she wasn't impressed with yet another American mission worker visiting the area.

So I handed her my Nikon. Try it, I asked her. See what happens.

What happened was that this once-sulky little girl showed an emerging talent as a photographer. I have many photos to prove that point. Now when I return to the island, I make a point to visit the beach and spend time with this family.

What would it matter, you might think, that a mission co-worker can connect with an individual in the country where she serves? Isn't that what I'm supposed to be doing? I ask myself the same thing quite often. And then in moments like when Dianerie showed me the photo of Menaïka with her name written on her arm, it became clear.

Where it would be ordinary for a local person to tell a mission co-worker, "I am glad to be with you," Dianerie was saying, "I want you to know my sister's name."

It's that important. More than that I come back to see them. More than that I once was able to help get their little brother medical care when he was ill. More than that I always give Dianerie a bit of pay for taking photos for me.

More than anything, she wants me to call her little sister by name.

That is the challenge of Haiti to me. That is the love of Haiti to me.

And that is why I am here.

I thank each and every one of you for your prayerful and financial support for my ministry here in Haiti. I value my work here as a companionship facilitator with a network of grassroots farmer organizations.

But more than that, I value our friendships.

I invite you to continue supporting our work here with your prayers and your financial gifts, and I invite you to come be with us in Haiti.

Come meet our sisters and brothers here.

Come be with me, and call them each by name.



HOW MIGHT YOU HELP A VILLAGE IN UGANDA?

This summer a Spanish teacher from Cosby High School (where Jane Werner teaches) is going on an education mission trip to a school in Uganda. In this community, the ability to speak English well is highly prized, so her team will be working with both teachers and students on English skills. The village recently received its first water pump with a spigot, saving the villagers daily treks to a river in the area. They will also be teaching the village

residents about health and hygiene in the home.

Each family will get a Ziploc bag filled with hotel-size shampoo, hotel-size lotions and small bars of soap. If you have a collection of these items or are traveling, please consider donating these items to be taken to this Ugandan community. In case you are interested in helping in other ways, the other items needed are combs/hair picks, toothbrushes and paste, and wash cloths. Another project is providing older girls with personal hygiene kits and underpants – sizes 10-16 are needed for that. A third is helping older boys learn how to use tools for installing mosquito nets in their sleeping quarters. For this project they could use drills, either hand drills or rechargeable battery models (they do have electricity at the school – courtesy of Engineers without Borders' solar panels – but not in the homes). YOUNG ADULT VOLUNTEER UPDATE

Hello from Boston! The snow has melted (finally), the ground is thawing (slowly), and my YAV year is well under way! I wanted to take this opportunity to thank members of Tuckahoe for supporting me with your prayers and with your monetary support, including the generous contribution of \$2,000 from the Endowment Fund.

I am learning about food justice through working at "A Place To Turn" food pantry and an adjacent Community Garden. My days include helping clients shop at the pantry, building a composting system, working in the community garden, and writing grant proposals. In the fall, I planned an Interfaith luncheon with my church – Hartford Street Presbyterian Church, a temple, and a mosque to celebrate a successful garden season and to share commonalities in the way our faith calls us to care for the Earth. Through the hard work of community volunteers, we were able to donate 400 pounds of fresh produce from the garden to the food pantry last year!

So, what exactly is food justice? The food justice movement advocates for all communities to have access to healthy, sustainable food. Think about the tomato in your salad. Now think about the journey it went through on the way to your plate – starting as a seedling, picked by a farm laborer, traveling to your grocery store, and being chosen by you! Being an informed consumer means being aware of the environmental, social, and nutritional impacts of the food you choose. The three YAV participants in Boston have spent this year looking at our food system through a critical lens. It is safe to say that all three of us have altered our eating habits in ways that will extend beyond just this year.

I am also pleased to let you know that as a result of my work this year, I will be attending General Assembly in June as an Overture Advocate on behalf of the Presbytery of Greater Boston. My interest in GA started when the Presbytery of the James sent me as a Young Adult Advisory Delegate to Portland, Oregon, in 2016. The connections I made in 2016 contributed to my interest in being an Overture Advocate, and the GA experience also influenced my decision to become a Young Adult Volunteer. Once again, I would like to thank my church family at Tuckahoe for supporting me in these various endeavors. I


