There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus.- Galatians 3:28

Immigration is in the news every day. It is a complex issue, charged with political, economic, and humanitarian considerations. People of good conscience take different sides of the debate as to what our policy should be resulting in very little agreement on what the right course for our country should be. One thing that can be agreed upon is that it is perhaps one of the most polarizing issues of our time.

As the church, I believe we walk our faith into the world. We should not sidestep this issue, nor should we

apply only our political ideology in forming our view and shaping how we become engaged. After all, Jesus himself engaged outsiders, people of non-Jewish descent. In Matthew 25:35 he is recorded saying, "for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me."

The Greek word for "stranger" is *xenos*, from which we get the term xenophobia. An organization in Southern Arizona called *No More Deaths* takes Jesus' mandate seriously and provides food, water, and basic medical aid to those crossing the desert. However, often their work has been criticized for encouraging illegal immigration.

It is evident that following Jesus' command is complicated in our modern era. As Christ's followers, it is important that we carefully consider how to apply his words. What might some of the challenges and limits be? How does our own country's history inform our views? What political implications affect the position we take and why?

But above all, what does the biblical witness teach us?

This summer, we will be considering all these factors in our Summer Enrichment Series, "For All of You Are ONE in Christ Jesus." In this 3-part series we will take a look at immigration in the United States through Biblical, historical, and socioeconomic eyes.

MISSION TRIP REPORT

Greenbrier County, WV was on the giving and the receiving end during the July 4th week. Edgewood Presbyterian hosted us at a clean, well-supplied campus near Lewisburg, complete with almost daily

sightings of a mama bear and her two cubs! We were welcomed by the weather and by people grateful for our help. And our first time working with WV Ministry of Advocacy and Workcamps was a terrific experience.

Greenbrier County was hit hard by flooding in June 2016 and families that lost their homes are in search of any shelter that can accommodate their families. Our 15 volunteers removed a porch and replaced it with a safe porch. We tore out flooring that was dangerous and replaced it with new flooring. And we insulated and sheet-rocked rooms, taped and mudded seams on sheet-rock, and moved a family of five closer to their own home.

Each of our volunteers feels like we receive so much more than we give with our work. We are thankful to be Christ's hands and feet in a time and place where it is needed. And we are grateful to each of you at Tuckahoe for supporting us in this work!

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY

With the opening of school approaching, it is a good time to consider volunteering as a tutor or classroom assistant at Oak Grove/Bellemeade School.

This will be the fourteenth year Tuckahoe has had a volunteer presence in this Richmond City public school. If one chooses to become a tutor, he or she would be working one on one with a single student. Classroom assistants work in the classroom, helping the teacher with a variety of tasks.

The time commitment is at least one hour per visit and may be weekly or bi-weekly. A background check is required as well as a brief orientation.

Presently our church has five individuals who are planning to return for the new school year. We would love to have more. The time spent with the children is never boring!

The groups meet in the bell room off of the sanctuary or in the sanctuary.




SHARE YOUR GIFTS OF HOSPITALITY AND CARING!


